The Honorable Joni Clonts

Mayor of Crockett

Ex-Officio Member of Mary Allen Museum Board

Mayor Clonts moved to Crockett from Houston in August 1992 after her father died. She is the daughter of Doyle Cook from Porter Springs and Mary Katherine Swearingen-Cook from the Arbor Community. She has always had a passion and love for Crockett and Houston County. This was evident and demonstrated with tears flowing down her cheeks every time she left the area.


She worked in Houston ISD until 1992 and then moved her family to Houston County. Their possessions were only three beds, a few dishes a small table with four chairs and a TV. They moved into a one-room cabin with no running water. The shower was outside on a pine tree and located near the cabin was an "out-house". The limited conveniences did not deter the move to Houston County because they loved the piney woods of East Texas, Houston County. Crockett was now their home.

Clonts received employment after an attorney in Crockett called and offered her a job. Approximately a month later, Realtor Charles Barney informed her of a building on the square that was for sale. She cleaned the dirt off the windows and was amazed that it had a little sandwich shop next to the building. She sought advice from her mother on the business adventure. With a candid and whimsical reply her mother said, "You cannot cook". Joni purchased the building and sandwich shop and developed entrepreneurial skills and she learned how to manage a cafe. A few years ago, she asked her mother if she thought her father would be pleased with her food business and other accomplishments. Her mother responded emphatically that, "he would be <u>very</u> pleased."

Her civic involvement and community service consist of: President of the Davy Crockett Pilot Club, President of the Downtown Beautification Committee for 12 years, organizer of the first Fourth of July Parade, Crockett Housing Authority Board member for two terms, and Chairman of the Houston County Republican Party since 1996 organizing all aspects of the Republican Primary. Joni Clonts and Charles Arnold brought back the World Championship Fiddlers Festival. Also, she served on the Crockett Chamber of Commerce Board and received the Citizen of the Year Award in 2015. In May 2017, she was elected the first woman to serve as Mayor of Crockett.

She attends Good Shepherd Fellowship Church and has been a member for nine years. She owns and operates the Moosehead Cafe located in downtown Crockett and the Crockett Printing located next door to the Crockett Post Office.

Mrs. Mary Ester (Thompson) Allen (1837-1886) the Women's for whom "Mary Allen College" Was Named.

In 1884 The General Assembly authorized the establishment of the Women's Executive Committee of the Board of Missions for Freedmen. Mary Allen (Mrs. Richard H Allen) assumed the position of chairperson of the new organization which had its first meeting in December of 1884.

Planting and Sowing the Seed of History



Callie Wynne Braggs

Sandra Berry recalls how instrumental her mother Callie Braggs was in saving the historical administration building of Mary Allen. Therefore, we revisit and revise an original article submitted by our past president to include the names of community leaders who helped to sow seeds in establishing the Mary Allen Museum.

"Callie Wynne Bragg, one of 10 children of the late Steve and Hattie Wynne, of the Fodice Community in Houston County, graduated from Mary Allen Jr. College in 1943. Her father was a sharecropper. Bragg attended Crockett Colored High School and reported "Of the 43 graduates of her Class of 1943, 90% of the students attended Mary Allen "because it was just right there." She earned her bachelor's degree from Wiley College in Marshall, Texas and continued on to attend Atlanta Clark University obtaining a master degree from the University of North Texas. Mrs. Bragg taught in Dallas ISD for 31 ½ years and later began to focus on the restoration of Mary Allen College.

As Founder, and first President of the Mary Allen Museum, Mrs. Bragg gave her all to restore Mary Allen College's education legacy. Community leaders who stood by her side or even served on the MAM Board were Mr. Otis Wooten, Mr. Jake Caprilian, Dr. Willie Wooten, Mrs. Agnes Rhoder, Ms. Roberta Mason, Mrs. Steve Lewis, Ms. Jenee, Bragg Guidry, Mrs. Jean Shepherd, Ms. Sandra Berry, Ms. Gloria Wooten, Ms. Cindy Garner, Mr. Nikita Warner, and others. The thought of Mary Allen having been reduced to a crumbling relic brought her to "tears most of the time," she once stated. The school closed in 1978 when Mrs. Braggs began the crusade to save what was left of Mary Allen College.

Her goal was to reopen the administration building as a multiethnic arts center and museum that pays tribute to Mary Allen's history. Mrs. Bragg once said, "I'm trying to plant a tree even though I may never enjoy its shade." Encouraged by Crockett preservationists and alumni across the country, she organized a board of directors including officials and local citizens, developed a mission statement, received 501c3 status, and launched the first fund-raising campaign to pay off the remaining debt of purchasing the property from a local businessman. The work that she did "Means a lot to us," said Birdie Houston, alumnae and President of Mary Allen's Dallas Alumni Chapter. One of the officials who met with Mrs. Bragg during the initial preservation discussions was Eliza Bishop, an 81-year old Crockett resident and Houston County Historical Commission Chairwoman. Ms. Bishop had already worked to list the Mary Allen Seminary on the National Registry of Landmarks in 1978. She joined the Board to help with the mission of restoration. "I grew up on that hill and can remember seeing the little girls going to seminary in their uniforms ... [Mrs. Bragg] has a dream to preserve that history, and I feel we can realize it," Ms. Bishop told a local reporter.

In 2000, Callie Bragg, Eliza Bishop, and Tim Culp, of the Crockett Economic and Industrial Development Corporation (CEIDC) submitted and received a \$17,500 matching funds grant from the Texas Preservation Trust Fund. Mrs. Bragg also invested more than \$26,000 personally, toward the \$95,000 required to purchase the school's administration building and surrounding 11.5 acres. The remaining \$34,000 was raised through donations and fundraising events throughout Crockett over a period of 10 years.

By 2001 the campus was overgrown strewn with discarded tires and broken furniture. Today the Board continues work to plant Callie Bragg's 'tree.' It is harvest time for us in the community to help bring the seeds planted for Mary Allen Museum and college concept into fruition.


